Agricultura Approach

- natural pesticides used
- growing crops/raising livestock that avoids
- -synthetic fertilizers/chemicals
- -hormones
- -antibiotic agents
- -irradiation
- -genetic engineering

- animals fed grass/forage (with the exception of milk before weaning)
- not fed grain or grain by-products

 not confined to a feedlot

Antibiotic Exposure no antibiotics or growth hormones (vaccines may be given for animal health)

Must indicate if feed formulation contained antibiotics (i.e. label will say "raised without antibiotics")

- higher prices
- lower antibiotic exposure
- reduced pesticide exposure

- distinct taste
- unique cooking qualities
- enhanced fatty acid profile
